#### **PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:**

##### **J. Lannon – street and water report**

Jason Lannon, Street & Water Supervisor appeared before the Board.

Street report: The crew is painting the snow equipment and they have repaired the worst of the damage from snowplowing and the damage from sidewalk snowplowing. The crew will attend safety training on May 11, 2023. The crew is working on re-building the storm drain vaults on West Main Street. Two need extra cribbing, so the crew will make them stronger with steel. The Lisk Park will be power washed, and the paint will be touched up at the end of April. Supervisor Lannon met with a structural engineer from Hunt Engineering regarding the cemetery wall.

Water report: Supervisor Lannon reported that the homeowner will be replacing their water line at 51 East Main Street. The Village will need to remove a sidewalk block and will re pour the block. The water valve is in the driveway of 49 East Main Street. Supervisor Lannon will be present to make sure nothing happens to that line and to make sure they have access to their driveway. The water tanks were power washed. There is a water break near the corner of Pearl Street and South Street. The crew will repair this tomorrow. Soon hydrants will be flushed, and main water valves will be turned. This will be done prior to the leak survey being completed.

##### **S. Upchurch – police report**

Scott Upchurch, Police Chief, appeared before the Board. Chief Upchurch has a company that will be bringing a demo radar trailer unit at the end of this week.

Chief Upchurch and Trustee Rickerson are working together on getting camera installation estimates the village hall building.

Meeting of April 10, 2023 continued:

Village of Clifton Springs Local Law No. 2 of the year 2023

A Local Law Amending Chapter 103 of the Code of the Village of Clifton Springs Relative to the Exemptions for Senior Citizens

Be it enacted by the Village Board of the Village of Clifton Springs as follows:

Section 1. §103-6 of Chapter 103 of the Code of the Village of Clifton Springs is hereby repealed and a new §103-6 is inserted in its place to read as follows:

§103-6. Exemption Granted/Limitations on Exemption

Pursuant to § 467 of the New York State Real Property Tax Law, real property owned by one or more persons, each of whom is 65 years of age or over, or real property owned by husband and wife, one of whom is 65 years of age or over, shall be exempt from Village of Clifton Springs taxes to the extent shown below of the assessed valuation thereof as determined by the owner's or owners' corresponding annual income:

| \$27,900.00          | to | \$28,799.99      | 25% |

This increase shall be effective with the 2023 assessment roll.

Section 2. Paragraph A of §103-2 of Chapter 103 of the Code of the Village of Clifton Springs is hereby repealed and a new paragraph A is inserted in its place to read as follows:

- A. If the income of the owner or the combined income of the owners of the property for the income tax year ("income tax year" shall have the meaning ascribed to it in § 467 of the New York State Real Property Tax Law) is equal to or exceeds \$29,700.00. Where the title is vested in either the husband or the wife, their combined income may not exceed such sum. Such income shall include social security and retirement benefits, interest, dividends, total gain from the sale or exchange of a capital asset, which may be offset by a loss from the sale or exchange of a capital asset in the same income tax year, net rental income, salary or earnings and net income from self-employment but shall not include a return of capital, gifts or inheritances. In computing net rental income and net income from self-employment, no depreciation deduction shall be allowed for the exhaustion or wear and tear of real or personal property held for the production of income.

Section 3. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this local law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been ordered.

Section 4. This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

Meeting of April 10, 2023 continued:

**Public Hearing on a Local Law to allow a property tax exemption  
for Volunteer Firefighters**

Mayor Keyes opened the public hearing at 6:30 PM. This hearing was properly advertised in THE FINGER LAKES TIMES on March 29, 2023. Notice of this hearing was posted on the Village website, sign board, front door of the village hall due to covid and also emailed to the Clifton Springs Fire Department, the assessors for the Town of Manchester and the Town of Phelps and to Ontario County Real Property Tax Department. Present for this public hearing was Charlie Hall, Volunteer Firefighter.

Mr. Hall addressed the Board and stated he appreciates the Village looking at this. Mr. Hall also hopes that this might help bring some volunteers to the fire department, especially during daytime hours.

Mr. Hall has reviewed the law and wanted the Board to know that in the fire department by laws, a member is considered a "lifetime member" after 25 years of service. This proposed law is written to grant an exemption after 20 years of service. Mr. Hall is concerned this might cause some confusion and the Board agreed. Mr. Hall also questioned what would happen if a lifetime member, who had lived in the Village but moved away, returned to the Village. Would this person be able to get the lifetime membership exemption?

Motion was made by Trustee Linsner 2<sup>nd</sup> by Trustee Rickerson to ask Attorney Graff to change the law to make the lifetime membership at 25 years, not 20 and to get the answer about if a person moves back into the Village. All members present voting AYE. Carried.

The public hearing closed at 6:35 PM.

For clarification, the Board does want to proceed with a property tax exemption for the volunteer fire fighters, just some wording in the law may need to be amended.

**Public Hearing on Amending Chapter 93 (Short-Term Rentals)  
of the Code of the Village of Clifton Springs**

Mayor Keyes opened the public hearing at 6:35 pm. This public hearing was properly advertised in THE FINGER LAKES TIMES on March 30, 2023. Notice of the public hearing was also placed in the Village website, sign board, front door of the village hall due to covid and mailed, both by certified mail and regular mail, to owners who advertise on social media that they have a short-term rental.

Deb Healy addressed the Board. Mrs. Healy operates a short-term rental. Mrs. Healy was looking for clarification on the recreation vehicle part of the law. Mrs. Healy understands that the current law does not allow recreation vehicles to be used as short-term rentals. Mrs. Healy asked if she has a short-term renter, can they bring a recreational vehicle on her property and have guests stay in it, and also if she has her own personal guests, can they bring a recreational vehicle onto her property and stay in it? Mayor Keyes told her yes, this is acceptable.

Kristin Reinhardt addressed the Board. Mrs. Reinhardt wanted to know why was the definition changing? Mayor Keyes stated that it was requested by Code Enforcement.

Village of Clifton Springs, Local Law No. 3 of the year **2023**

A local law Amending Chapter 93 (Short-Term Rentals) of the Code of the Village of Clifton Springs

Be it enacted by the Board of Trustees Village of Clifton Springs as follows:

Section 1: Section 93-4 (Word usage) of Chapter 93 (Short-Term Rentals) of the Code of the Village of Clifton Springs is hereby amended by repealing the existing definition of "Short-Term Rental" and adopting a new definition of "Short-Term Rental" to be inserted in its place and to read as follows:

**SHORT-TERM RENTAL –**

- A. The rental of any dwelling or dwelling unit or part thereof for less than 30 days to an individual or individuals. A recreational vehicle shall not be considered a dwelling, dwelling unit, short-term rental or short-term rental property for purposes of this chapter and shall not have a short-term rental permit issued for it.
- B. For purposes of this Chapter, bed-and-breakfasts, boardinghouses, motels and hotels are excluded from this definition, as are month-to-month tenancies.
- C. The presence of the following shall create a presumption that all or a part of a building is being used as a short-term rental:
  - 1. All or a part of the building is offered for lease on a short-term rental website, including but not limited to Airbnb, Home Away, VRBO and the like for a period of less than 30 days or less; and/or
  - 2. All or a part of the building is offered for lease in any medium for a period of less than 30 days.
- D. The presumptions in paragraph C herein may be rebutted by evidence presented to the Code Enforcement Officer that the building is not being used as a short-term rental.

Section 2: If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this local law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been ordered.

Section 3: This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

Trustee Lincoln was not present. Carried.

**Williamson Law Book – water & sewer billing program**

The Clerk’s have met with Williamson Law Book, and they prefer to change to this program. The reason this is being looked at is changes have to happen with the reading of the water meters (change in technology) and now is the time to look at updating the water and sewer program.

Motion was made by Trustee Gray 2<sup>nd</sup> by Trustee Linsner to change from the existing water sewer billing program to Williamson Law Book. All members present voting AYE. Carried. This change will happen on the Clerk’s end in July and the new software should be being used for the August 2023 billing cycle.

**STREET DEPARTMENT:** Trustee Lincoln was not present, and this report was covered under privilege of the floor.

**WATER DEPARTMENT:** Trustee Lincoln was not present and this report was covered under privilege of the floor.

**SEWER DEPARTMENT:** Trustee Rickerson reported the following:

The Village is still waiting for the compost permit from the Department of Environmental Conservation. The Village understanding is the delay is on the engineering end.

The Village is still waiting for approval from the Department of Environmental Conservation for the required disinfection process and for possible headworks improvements. The Village understanding is the delay is on the engineering end. The Village is very concerned that necessary benchmarks on the disinfection will not be met, and the Village is also very concerned that the Village has missed the proper timing to put this project out to bid, as most contractors have lined their work up for this upcoming year. Mayor Keyes will reach out to Hunt Engineering regarding these concerns.

**ZONING & PLANNING DEPARTMENTS:** Trustee Gray had nothing to report.

**FIRE DEPARTMENT:** See public hearing on the tax exemption for volunteer fire fighters. This local law was not adopted this evening, as the Board and the public had some questions to address with the attorney.

**Fire Department submits proposed truck replacement schedule**

Trustee Linsner handed out the proposed truck replacement schedule as submitted by Chief Steve DeCook. The proposal is as follows:

The Village has requested price estimates for these trucks, particularly the first three, as they are all within the next 11 years. The department is on the agenda for the May 8, 2023 Board meeting and truck replacement is one of the conversations, along with a possible new storage building and a digital sign request.

**Park and Creek cleanup & Cemetery clean up**
